Spotlight on ... behaviour

Behaviour at our school is generally very good. When I think about other schools in which I have worked, and other schools that I have visited, we have a super culture here. A big part of our behaviour routine is our clear and simple school rules:

Think before you act - be ready, be respectful, be safe.

Every class thinks about these rules at the start of each academic year, and what they mean for their age. Being ready in Beech class is very different from being ready in Willow class, for example! However, having our rules, and growing with them as they move through the school is a key way in which we support our children to not only develop good behaviour characteristics during their time with us, but for the rest of their lives.

If a child behaves in a way we think is not following our school rules, we will always take the time to explain to them why we think this is, and how they could modify their behaviour, so that we are coaching them through this time. Children must be expected to make mistakes while they are learning how to live in our world, and so we take these opportunities to teach the children. If, after this teaching, children still show the behaviour, we follow our behaviour steps (displayed around school and on our website in the behaviour policy) which give children the chance to make a change.

We never label the child, only the behaviour. We would not say a child has been naughty; we would say that they have shown poor behaviour, or they have made a poor behaviour choice. This is very important from a psychological point of view.

In October 2022, the enormously popular social media network Twitter was purchased by tech tycoon Elon Musk, That sparked a host of changes to the platform – not all which have been received positively by its fans.
